KEEPING IN TOUCH

In this modern times, keeping in touch has never been so easy especially with the innovation of the internet and emailing. The tradition of getting news from the newspaper, radio, television, telephone, your neighbour and postman has been a way, supplanted by the internet, emailing, handphone & its features. Not that the old styles have been totally decimated as they still have their uses and are still used by many. But many have evolved with new features. Take for instance the telephone. Added to this device is the fax which is attached to the telephone. And this feature itself made the telex machine obsolete. With the telephone now you can even get the latest news or even the latest stock prices.

Times have changed and even Rotary in order to survive has to adapt. The Bulletin for many Rotary clubs for instance, are now not printed for members. They are emailed to them and the members have the option to just view and delete, or view and download. Besides saving cost on printing, the coverage can be more attractive with more information. Rotary International sends out many forms and information through the emailing system, thus saving on cost as well as time. We would like to believe that the speed of the communication makes the organisation more efficient as well as the Rotary club itself.

But keeping in touch with these modern gadgets has its drawbacks. Oldtimers still not adapted to their uses will feel leftout. Keeping in touch in this way has made life very impersonal particularly in running the club. Sending notices of meetings through SMSs and Emails has in a way detached members from each other. Members no longer feel obligated and don't even have to give excuses for not turning up. Thus nothing like the personal touch supported by the human voice. Even the secretary's human voice sometimes is not good enough. Rotarian's voice to Rotarian can never be replaced in terms of the personal touch!

Keeping in touch is not just calling each other up. **Keeping in touch also means looking at each other face to face, talking and exchanging news.** Keeping in touch also means fellowship. Without fellowship, Rotary cannot succeed. That is why Rotary has mandated weekly meetings so that members can meet up with each other at least once a week to keep in touch. **That is why we have the Attendance Rule.** It is believed that it is easier to carry out projects together as friends. And all this can be achieved through keeping in touch, not once in a while but constantly thus promoting fellowship.

Pudu, like most Rotary clubs around the world, has devised ways to keep in touch besides its weekly meetings. We have fellowship outings, fellowship meetings, firesides, AGMs, overseas trips, committee meetings, family outings etc. **We even have a fellowship chairman!** It is a very important position in the club as the success or failure of a club can be on the shoulder of this person!
