AN OVERVIEW OF ROTARY MEMBERSHIP

John T. Blount, RI Director

“Rotary rapidly grew because of action-oriented, tireless, committed workers like Ches Perry, Arch Klumph, Bru Brunnier, Paul Harris, and Jim Davidson of Calgary, Canada. Big Jim, as he was called, exemplifies the commitment of these men; he spent two and a half years traveling over 150,000 miles with his wife and young daughter from Europe to Asia at a cost of US\$250,000 of his own fortune – in 1928-31 – to start 23 new clubs in the most prominent cities in Eastern Europe, Asia, and the Mideast. Quite simply, we grew because of a new and unique concept, an aggressive, well-organized corporate mentality, and the passion of our sales force of committed leaders.

From decades three through five, 1925 to 1955, our annual growth averaged nearly 5 percent – that’s 10,000 to 15,000 Rotarians each year, except for small losses two years during the Great Depression and two years during World War II.

During the 1950s, ‘60s, ‘70s, ‘80s, and early ‘90a, our average annual membership increase ranged from 1.5 percent to 4 percent, which means we grew from 12,000 to 40,000 Rotarians each year.

Why this ongoing, sustained growth?

“The famous American industrialist of the early 20th century, Andrew Carnegie, said, “Take away my people, and leave my factories, and soon grass will grow on my factories’ floors. Take away my factories, and leave my people, and soon I will have new and better factories.”

Rotary’s service, Rotary’s good work, Rotary’s programs and projects are our factories, And without our people, grass will grow on our factories’ floors. But with strong, bright, able Rotarians, our factories – our good works – will be vibrant and on going.

Not growing, not investing in our people is not an option for Rotary.”

“Some say that in the 21st century, Rotary’s time is passed, our model is outdated, the world is too complex, people are too busy, and business and professionals with discretionary authority in their working life are hard to discern and even harder to attract.

I say the time for Rotary to flourish is now. I say the world is no more cold and uncaring than it’s ever been, that business is no more dishonest than it was 100 years ago, and that leaders are no more difficult to find than they ever were.

I say that a few degrees of change in our methods will unvell a beautiful new vista for future generations of Rotarians”

“...please consider your corner of the world and identify which of the Rotary habits in your region are old-fashioned, perhaps a bit dingy and outdated, and distinguish those traditions that are timeless. And then do what we’ve done since our infancy: Run to seize the future and shape it, so that we have better communities and a better world.”

Commit to Rotaract and learn

Starting a Rotaract club in Dubai, United Arab Emirates, was not easy for Abdallah Mehelba.

A longtime Rotaractor who had served as president of the Rotaract Club of Alexandria-Pharos, Egypt, Mehelba worked for two years before a core group came together, with the help of the single Rotary club in Dubai. But eventually, the club received its charter in 2008, with Mehelba as its president.

That experience taught him about perseverance and the importance of remaining dedicated to Rotaract, a message he shared 19 June during the Rotaract Preconvention Meeting on the campus of McGill University in Montréal, Québec, Canada.

"Commit to Rotaract. Learn from everyone around you. Share with them. [Help] them to work and develop their skills," Mehelba urged. "If you do this, you will learn a lot from Rotaract, and you will experience things that you will never experience in any other organization in the world."

Mehelba became a Rotaractor in 1998, shortly after his father joined a Rotary club in Alexandria and asked him to start a Rotaract club. He recalls the challenge of that experience as well, with a handful of Rotaractors meeting with three or four Rotarians from the sponsor club, "discussing things we didn't understand a single thing about. We had to move on from month to month, learning."

The club did learn and grow. After serving as its president, Mehelba became a district Rotaract representative in 2003-04, making 12 trips to five countries and meeting thousands of Rotaractors. In 2007-08, he served on Rotary International's Rotaract Committee.

He began his second year as president of the Dubai club just before he turned 30, the upper age limit for Rotaractors, but was able to serve out the year as a past president.

"Rotaract never ends, except when the age comes," Mehelba said. "I don't think anyone should leave Rotaract except to join Rotary. I have served for 12 years, which is the maximum. But it's not an ending. A new beginning will [come] soon with Rotary."

From his experience with launching two clubs, he said he would advise anyone trying to start a Rotaract club to focus initially on fellowship.

"Don't worry about projects at first," Mehelba said. "Develop those strong bonds between members and with your Rotary club, which can offer a lot of assistance, including member referrals and financial support. That will give you the momentum to move on."

World Water Summit III in Montreal

MONTREAL (June 19, 2010) — Aggressive efforts by Rotary clubs to help solve the global water and sanitation crisis -- which claims more than two million lives each year, including 4,000 children every day -- will be front-and-center during the World Water Summit III, set for June 19 at the Delta Centre-Ville Hotel.

Keynote speakers at this one-day event, organized by the Water & Sanitation Rotarian Action Group, include Guy Laliberté, founder of Montréal's famous Cirque du Soleil and the ONE DROP Foundation (8:45 a.m.); Charissa Brocklehurst, chief of UNICEF's Water, Environment and Sanitation Programs Division (11:35 a.m.); and John Lane, executive director of the Water Supply and Sanitation Collaborative Council and former head of WaterAid.

"One billion people lack access to safe water and 2.5 billion to adequate sanitation, and Rotary clubs are perfectly positioned to do something about it," says F. Ronald Denham, of Toronto, who chairs the action group, an international organization of Rotary members interested in water and sanitation issues.

He says Rotary is committed to helping achieve the UN Millennium Development Goal that calls for a 50 percent reduction by 2015 in the number of people with insufficient access to safe water and sanitation. From 1978 through 2009, The Rotary Foundation awarded 4,923 grants totaling US\$52.7 million for water and sanitation projects worldwide.

"Rotary club members worldwide are helping communities develop rainwater harvesting systems, install filters, drill wells and construct pipelines, dams and ponds," Denham adds. "On the sanitation side, many others are helping build latrines and toilet blocks in slums throughout Africa and Asia, and are taking the lead in educating the public about the benefits of personal hygiene in preventing waterborne diseases."

Laliberté, founder of the Montréal-based ONE DROP Foundation, sees water as the common thread connecting many social and economic problems. "Water is the source of life, and every single humanitarian crisis can be linked back to a water issue," he says.

Rotary also recently launched an alliance with the U.S. Agency for International Development to implement sustainable, long-term water, sanitation and hygiene projects in the Dominican Republic, Ghana and the Philippines.

Rotary's strength at the grassroots level -- 33,000 clubs in more than 200 countries and areas with a total

membership over 1.2 million men and women -- makes the humanitarian service organization adept at tailoring projects to fit community needs. Says Denham: "This is an enormous challenge for humanity, and Rotary clubs are logical leaders in the challenge because they are embedded in their local communities, allowing the clubs to help define realistic solutions to local problems."

Rotary International President John Kenny made water and sanitation a top issue for Rotary clubs, challenging them "to focus on water and

sanitation, as the scarcity of clean water is an increasingly serious issue in many parts of the world." In 2007, Prince Charles, president of WaterAid, a UK-based nonprofit, presented Kenny, a native Scot, with the President's Award for Outstanding Voluntary Service to WaterAid. In fact, Kenny often uses an old Scottish saying that is particularly appropriate for the World Water Summit: "We must look beyond our own parish pump."

What's new for clubs and districts

A new Rotary year is set to begin, and with it a number of changes to the way clubs and districts do business.

The annual per capita dues that Rotary clubs pay to Rotary International will increase to US\$50 in 2010-11, as established by the 2007 Council on Legislation. The 2010 Council approved a \$1 increase for the three subsequent years, setting per capita dues at \$51 for 2011-12, \$52 for 2012-13, and \$53 for 2013-14.

The 2010 Council, which met in April, took several other actions that will go into effect 1 July:

- E-clubs will become a permanent part of Rotary International after years of participating in a pilot project. Districts will be allowed up to two e-clubs, which are defined as Rotary clubs that meet through electronic communications. Some of the pilot e-clubs have been meeting solely through online forums, while others have combined electronic with in-person meetings.
- New Generations Service will join the other Avenues of Service -- Club Service, Vocational Service, Community Service, and International Service. Before starting a project, Rotarians are asked to think broadly about how their club and its members can contribute within each avenue.
- Rotarians in North America will have the choice of receiving either an electronic or print version of The

Rotarian magazine. Rotarians living at the same address may qualify for a joint subscription.

Here are some changes that will primarily affect Rotary districts:

- District assemblies must be held in March, April, or May, and presidents-elect training seminars in February or March.
- The chair of the nominating committee for district governor must notify the current governor of the committee's candidate within 24 hours, and the governor must inform clubs within 72 hours.
- When a governor-elect position is vacant less than three months before the International Assembly, the successor will automatically fill the vacancy, if he or she is willing.
- If two or more governor election complaints are filed in a district in a five-year period and the Board believes that the RI Bylaws or election complaint procedures have been violated, it may disqualify the nominee, select a past governor to serve, and remove any governor, governor-elect, or past governor who is improperly influencing or interfering with the election process. The Board may dissolve any district and reassign its clubs to other districts if three or more election complaints are filed in a five-year period.

Here are some changes that will primary affect Rotary clubs:

- No club may limit membership based on sexual orientation.
- Clubs must inform their district governor of a proposed change to the club name or locality at least 10 days before voting on the proposal.
- The immediate past club president will be considered a club officer and a member of the board.
- The RI Board may suspend or terminate the membership of any club that retains any member who has misused funds from The Rotary Foundation or who otherwise has breached the stewardship policies of the Foundation.
- Clubs accepting a transferring or former Rotarian must first secure a certificate from the former member's club confirming that person's membership. The former club is obligated to verify that the member does not owe any debts to the club. A prospective member cannot join a new club until all debts have been paid.
